The history making continued for this amazing group of players when Five became Six on a sunny Sixth of October 2024. Diarmuid Masterson lifted the O' Donoghue Cup for his first time as captain in front of a jubilant crowd of Bray Emmets Supporters after a hard-fought win over a Carnew Team. The score line of Bray Emmets 0-23 Carnew Emmets 4-8 indicated a close result and at times there were fears that the south Wicklow men may sneak it. However a powerful second half performance allayed those fears. Having achieved "Five in a row" in 2023, people outside the camp may have felt that Bray were vulnerable. Following the loss to Thomastown in the 2023 Leinster Intermediate final, Paul Carley, the inspirational manager who had guided this group since 2017 decided to step away. Furthermore two stalwarts Ben McCormack and Michael Boland had moved to Australia. Padraig Doyle and Daire Henderson had moved to England. Talk around the county was that Bray would not reach the heights of 2023 again. There was a scramble in early 2024 to find a manager. After an exhaustive but ultimately fruitless search for an outside manager, John Henderson and Ronan O Brien agreed to take on the role as joint managers. Peter Walsh joined management as selector and Alan Malone joined as S&C coach working across the Senior Hurling and Senior Football teams.

Senior players stepped up to lead the group from within and Diarmuid Masterson was announced as captain with Seánie Maloney was vice-captain.

As usual we competed in the Wicklow Senior Hurling League, Dublin Hurling League and the Wicklow Senior Hurling championship. Conor McNally, Ben Kearney, Cian Lohan, Davy Maloney, Ronan Mc Mahon, Sean Kenny, Eoin McCormack and Luke Maloney played with the Wicklow county team. Brian Nesbitt played with the Senior Football Panel. James Byrne, Fiachra Ó Dunaí, Cillian Ryder, Tristan Doherty and Seán Kenny played with county under 20 panel. The initial target was to consolidate our position in Division 3 of the Dublin league and the 25th February saw victory at home against Ballyboden, followed by wins away against Na Fianna and Round towers. Our first loss came away to Naomh Mearnóg where an impressive opposition were searching for some revenge having lost to us in the 2023 Leinster championship campaign.

As the season progressed, we found ourselves unbeaten in the Wicklow Hurling League and we were in line for promotion in Dublin after wins against St Vincent's and a memorable win recovering from an 8 point deficit at half time against O' Tooles – Ciaran Kelly with his senior debut and young Tristan Doherty finishing up with 1-01. Promotion was not achieved however after a disappointing loss away to St Maur's in Rush. Wins against Naomh Olaf and Commercials and Naomh Fionnbarra were interrupted by a loss against a very impressive Clontarf in Bray.

With some of the experienced players unavailable due to injury or with the County panels, these games provided excellent opportunities for new players to get senior hurling exposure.

The Wicklow Senior Hurling League saw us unbeaten, and we were drawn to meet Carnew in the Final of the League on 23th June. The result did not go our way after a pedestrian performance saw us go down by 3-08 to 0-11 points. The by-line on the Bray People read "Improvements needed by both sides ahead of championship" – never a truer word!

Onto the Senior hurling championship which started in Mid-July. Following a win away to Éire Óg we took on a determined Kiltegan team who have been our toughest opponents over the last 3 years. Kiltegan brought huge work-rate and physicality to the county grounds but a determined Bray team held on to win by a goal in what was the closest game of the year. Easier wins over Glenealy, St Pat's and Carnew got us back into the county semi-final. Despite a big difference on the scoreboard, neither players nor management were fully happy with the performance.

County Final day was the 6th October 2024 against Carnew. The biggest Bray crowd in years made their way to Aughrim. Talk in the press had centred around the team's loss to Carnew in the League final. As is expected, Carnew came out determined to raise doubts in the Bray team and they caused havoc in the Bray full-back line for a time, rifling home two goals in the opening half. However powerful display from the Bray Emmets half-back line and superb displays from Diarmuid Masterson, Eoin McCormack, Marc Lennon and Ronan McMahon helped Bray gain a foothold in the game where it looked in danger of slipping away.

This Bray team has become known for their third quarter scoring performances. Hence few were surprised in Echelon Park Aughrim when Bray turned around to play with the wind and register five points on the bounce from a rejuvenated Christy Moorehouse (one from play and two frees), Eoin McCormack and Marc Lennon who booted the ball inches over the opposition crossbar. Carnew struck back with a goal and a point to cut the lead by one. Brian Nesbitt and Arran Murphy came off the bench to steady the ship. Despite another goal going in from a free, Bray held on and captain Masterson lifted the cup while Christy Moorehouse was voted Man of the Match. Indeed the talk was that he will need a bigger mantlepiece to carry the many man of the match awards won in county finals.

At time of writing, we are now preparing for a Leinster Intermediate Hurling Championship where we will take on the Meath Champions Ratoath. As ever the panel's commitment to training is strong and the togetherness has been evident.

In summary, 2024 has been a hugely successful year for this large panel of players. Competition for places on the team and panel has been fierce. We continue to be proud of their leadership and commitment to the club. We had players returning to play and train despite working abroad. Marc Lennon recently guided the Minor team to the county final. Other panel members also helped out with underage teams, while Brian McCann was a selector with the Wicklow Under 20 team.

Over the last number of years we have recognised the need to help the transition from underage to adult and we continue to welcome younger members to train with us. Our aim continues to represent the club to the highest standards and develop hurling in Bray. As always, we would like to again thank all Club members and the Club Executive for all their support and encouragement throughout the year.

We thank our sponsors for their generous sponsorship. Our sights are now set to challenge again for Leinster honours.

Adult Camogie

2024 was a mixed year for the adult camogie teams. At the beginning of the year, we fielded two teams at senior and junior level.

The juniors got to the league final and were unfortunate to lose it in a tight battler. It was hopeful to see that such a young team could hold their own against adult players. The real breakthrough for adult camogie will be when we can field junior and senior at league and championship.

The seniors had their most challenging league campaign in three years, having reached the final in 2022 and 2023. In 2024, we did not challenge the league to any extent.

Unfortunately, we could field only a senior team at championship which was challenging as we were hit by the absence of players on J1 and travelling. This is a feature each year due to the young age profile of the senior camogie team. The positive of this is that many senior camogie debutantes proved that they could hold their own when called upon. Once players returned, momentum was restored, and things began to improve. Numbers at training increased, as did intensity which meant that we could enter our relegation battle confident that we could win. We won the match to maintain our status at senior level for a fifth year. The last time we had a relegation battle, our following year was our most successful, hopefully we will replicate this in 2025. Thank you to our sponsor passive dynamics who supported us for another year.





Senior Football

The Division 1 Senior Football League commenced on 24th February with a trip to Roundwood for an untried Bray Emmets team. It proved a difficult assignment as an experienced An Tóchar side ran out deserved winners 2-17 to 2-5. A week later in a much improved display we put 4-9 on the scoreboard against a weakened Avondale side.

This was followed by a trip to Rathnew and despite losing a very close tough contest, nevertheless we were in this game right to the end. It was a very pleasing performance as we fielded a number of our young players making their senior debut in Wicklow senior football.

A home defeat in another tight game to local rivals Eire Óg was disappointing, but we showed great spirit and never gave up. In our three remaining games we lost narrowly to both AGB and Tinahely, but showed great character in holding Blessington the reigning County Champions to a draw in Bray. Unfortunately we found ourselves in a bottom 4 playoff and were subsequently relegated to the Division 1A League just finishing behind Blessington on points difference.

The draw for the Championship we felt gave rise to opportunity where we found ourselves in a tough group with Barndarrig, Dunlavin, Eire Óg Greystones, AGB and Rathnew.

We played Barndarrig in our first match of the Championship and needed to be patient after finding ourselves level at half-time despite having the majority of possession. However, we pulled away in the second half and finished the game with an impressive score of 4-07 to 0-10.

Senior Football

Next up was AGB a team that has been knocking on the Championship door for the last number of years. We got off to a great start with two early goals but faltered badly just before halftime conceding two goals ourselves. It proved to be a difficult day for us as AGB ran out comfortable winners at the end. We renewed our rivalry with Rathnew in Arklow in our third match of the Championship. Much similar to our previous league encounter we matched them point for point, but a dangerous tackle on the impressive James Healy was a turning point with James having to be withdrawn. To compound the unfortunate, the Referee took no disciplinary action against the Rathnew player which was surprising. A pivotal game for us to remain in contention in the group was the Eire Óg match on a tight pitch in Ashford. The improvement in our performance was impressive as both teams swapped points throughout the match. On the day it was our defensive stubbornness that laid the foundation for our second win in the group 0-11 to 0-10. With all teams beating each other we were in with a great chance to qualify to the knockout stages. Our final group match was against Dunlavin where we knew a win would give us a place in the quarterfinals. The concession of two goals in the second half proved the difference, although credit must go to the players who dragged themselves back into the game but just fell short by one point at the end.

Adding insult to injury was a general belief that we had a perfectly good goal disallowed at a crucial period in the second half of the game. This year's Championship was one of the most competitive in many years with every team on their day capable of winning it.

Tinahely lost three matches in the group stages this year but still believed in themselves and are now the newly crowned County Champions.

Perhaps an example to be heeded by us all next year.



The Dermot Earley Youth Leadership Initiative

The Dermot Earley Youth Leadership Initiative has been a remarkable addition to our club, offering teenagers aged 15- 18, especially Transition Year students, a unique opportunity to develop their leadership skills.

Accredited by the National University of Ireland, Galway, as a Foundation Certificate in Youth Leadership and Community Action, the program spanned the academic year and was designed to nurture young leaders through a blend of facilitated and self-directed learning. With 19 enthusiastic participants guided by four trained facilitators — Nathan Prunty, Brenda Donohoe, Jenny Lackey and Claire Brennan- the program was divided into three modules. The first module concentrated on personal leadership skills and self-awareness, while the second focused on team leadership. The final module required participants to implement 20- hour community action project, allowing them to apply their skills in real — world contexts.

Impressively, 16 participants completed all three modules and will be awarded a Level 6 Foundation Certificate from National University of Ireland, Galway on November 23rd, an accomplishment that also contributes to the Gaisce Awards program requirements. This initiative not only fostered leadership but also empowered young individuals to make a positive impact in their communities.

We're excited about the upcoming programme in 2025 and are eager to welcome passionate individuals over the age of 21yrs to join us as facilitators. He's a hardy buck and deserves his place with the seniors. Hopefully more of the lads keep pushing to get up to the senior team.

Thanks to Michael Roddy for his excellent training sessions, the legendary Mick O Byrne for all his hurling insight and player/manager Eoin Mason who could still play for the county if he wanted but has a lot to offer in management.

Junior Hurling

We started back training in late February with a healthy squad of 50 odd players agreeing to play junior/ intermediate Hurling. As the month went on players who would eventually go on to play intermediate hurling were training with the senior panel. Which meant we had about 20 players training at junior sessions. As the weeks went on numbers would fall between a hard core group of 12 to 15 players as more players were called to train with the seniors

To all the players who trained and togged Out a massive thank you. Finally, to Graham Bushe a massive thank you for doing all the admin work and helping out on the line it's massively appreciated.

Development and Facilities Report

2024 was a busy year in terms of maintaining and upgrading the facilities as well as seeking new funding for development. We have been successful in securing €153000 from the Community Sports Facilities Fund which was applied for in 2023. This funding will enable us to upgrade our flood lighting in pitch 1 and all weather pitch to more energy efficient systems, thereby making savings on fuel costs. It will also enable us to invest in technology on pitch markings. Planning has already started on this work. We were unsuccessful for another grant of €120,000 to improve access around our grounds but we are hopeful to resubmit this application next year.

The major area of development in 2024 was in the planning for a new walkway around the club that will improve access for all as well as providing exercise opportunities for walkers. The closed loop walkway, when complete, will be approximately 1.2km in length. The funding for the walkway is through the JP McManus Fund provided to all GAA clubs in Ireland which we gratefully acknowledge. Work will have commenced on the walkway by the time of the AGM.

We also initiated work on developing a vision for the next major step in development, ie a sports hall and gym. Survey work was carried out in terms of location and size as well as creating a prototype of the sports hall.

The purchase of the land from the County Board has not moved forward and appears to be stalled on the County Board's legal side in registering the land. We will continue to push to close the purchase. It has been a very frustrating experience for all concerned.

Borg Developments are selling their lands adjacent to our grounds and we are in discussions with them and the new prospective owner to ensure our interests in the Right of Way we have over those lands are maintained.


We also continue to trial new technologies that will reduce our maintenance costs. The Robotic mower on pitch 1 was a particular machine of interest not only to our members but to the resident seagulls!

There is a lot of hidden work carried out in maintaining our club ground to the high standards that often people take as a given. Sincere thanks to Liam, Paddy, Billy, Ger, Niall and all the volunteers who give their time. We are very reliant on a small number of people in managing our facilities which is a key risk. We are in the process of building greater resilience in this area which we hope to update the club in the new year.



Children's Officer report 2024

The Gaelic Games Associations are committed to creating and maintaining the safest possible environment for all young people who wish to participate in our Gaelic Games and activities. An important part of this is the mandatory appointment of a Children's Officer to each club. The role of the Children's Officer is central to maintaining the safeguarding of children and young people in our Gaelic Games Associations and to the implementation of the Code of Behaviour (Underage).

Throughout this year I aimed to get to know the many members of our Club and in particular team mentors, players and parents - hopefully at this stage most of the teams are familiar with who I am! It is always interesting to get to know all those involved with our many club teams from Academy right through to Adult, and to give our juvenile players the opportunity to give feedback where possible, which helps to inform us on future planning for the needs of our club.

From an administrative perspective my role involves ensuring that all club members working with children and young people are garda vetted, have attended child safeguarding training and have coaching qualifications relevant to their role. Garda vetting and Safeguarding must be updated every three years for all coaches and mentors of teams with players under 18 years of age. We are very fortunate to have the support of Willie Braine to deliver safeguarding and coach training on a regular basis, and to be on hand to provide guidance to the teams whenever it is needed.

Promoting the Give Respect – Get Respect initiative amongst club members of all ages is central to maintaining a positive experience for everyone in Bray Emmets. It underpins the Code of Behaviour which is followed by all of our teams at training, matches and other club events. Sincere thanks to all the coaches and mentors in the club who always strive to give all players an enjoyable sporting experience in Bray Emmets.

Huge thanks to the club committees for their support this year and especially to Brenda Donohue (juvenile boys chairperson and DLP) and Marie Curran (juvenile girls chairperson) for their advice and guidance throughout the year.
